# **TECH TIP CORNER**

When winching in slippery conditions like mud or snow, position the winch anchor point as directly in front of the vehicle as possible to avoid side loads that could cause the vehicle to shift unpredictably. Use a tree saver strap or snatch block to prevent damage to the winch line and ensure a secure hold. Suction from mud can create additional resistance. Maintain steady tension on the winch line and avoid sudden jerks, which can cause shock load and damage. Wear heavy-duty gloves when handling the winch line, as mud and debris make it slippery and increase injury risk. Lastly, place a recovery damper or weighted object on the winch line to reduce recoil risk in case of cable or strap failure, ensuring a safer recovery.

# **Camping Corner with Brendon**

This month's topic is campsite cooking! What kind of stove or heat source do you use- a high-end Jet Boil, a Walmart or Coleman camp stove, or something else? Cast iron heats evenly but is heavy, while lightweight kits can burn food; I prefer the Stanley kit for its balance of weight and heat distribution. My go-to heat sources are a jet stove for boiling water and a Coleman single burner, though the latter lacks a wind deflector and fine simmer control. Alternative cooking methods include a collapsible Coleman oven, a Can Cooker, and an Omnia Oven, all used with a camp stove. If you prefer cooking over a fire or charcoal, cast iron works best, and you can even heat food in a can-just be sure to open it first! I'll be teaching at the MOORE Expo in April and a local overlanding class this spring/summer. Reach out if you have questions-happy camping!


